Jeffrey Withaya Campbell is currently engaged by the <u>Asia-Europe Foundation</u> (ASEF) as the technical and social media coordinator for <u>culture360.org</u>.

culture 360.org is a platform to inform, collaborate and exchange ideas amongst the arts and cultural communities across Asia and Europe.

The "new" Open Source culture360.org socially networked community magazine platform will be launched in April 2010. In the spirit of collaboration and shared innovation, the platform will be available for redistribution to any non-profit culture sector organization.

Jeffrey was brought on to the culture360.org project because of his hybrid IT/Culture sector background. His first degree was in Multimedia Design and Technology. In 2000 he was part of a team developing the online community @ <u>iAgora.com</u>. From there he went on to the internationally recognized <u>Technology for Social Justice</u>, Reach for the Clouds Project, a "resident-maintained networked community" in an ethnically-diverse, low-income, public housing estate in Melbourne, Australia. It was from these early experiences, that he became fascinated with the Internet and all its possibilities, particularly community building and participation.

In 2004-7 he completed a Master in Sustainable Heritage Development at the Australian National University and worked in an ICT capacity at <u>UNESCO Bangkok's Culture Unit</u> and <u>The Beijing Cultural Heritage Protection Center</u> (BJCHP). There he witnessed first hand the difficulties the culture sector faced attempting to harness the power of the Internet, with limited IT skills and financial resources.

During 2007-8 he worked on the <u>Australian Greens Party</u> Federal election campaign's new media team and was witness to, and participant of, the evolution of

<u>NowPublic.com</u>, the largest and fastest-growing participatory news network in the world. His blog <u>MandarinScholarship.com</u> was voted best English language education blog in Taiwan in 2008.

Jeffrey is a keen advocate of <u>Creative Commons</u> and Open Source technologies, as they are essential tools and platforms for new media arts and culture, and represent cultures of collaboration, sharing and promotion of access to tools and knowledge.

He is currently considering a PhD program at the Korea Advanced Institute of Science and Technology (KAIST) <u>Graduate School of Culture Technology</u> (GSCT).

A former president of the Bangladesh Photographic Society, Alam set up the award winning Drik agency, the Bangladesh Photographic Institute and Pathshala, the South Asian Institute of Photography, considered one of the finest schools of photography in the world. Director of the Chobi Mela festival and chairman of Majority World agency, Alam's work has been exhibited in galleries such as MOMA in New York, the Centre Georges Pompidou in Paris, the Royal Albert Hall in London and The Museum of Contemporary Arts in Tehran. A guest curator of the National Art Gallery in Malaysia and the Brussels Biennale, Alam's numerous photographic awards include the Mother Jones and the Andrea Frank Awards. He has been a jury member in prestigious international contests, including World Press Photo, which he chaired. An Honorary Fellow of the Bangladesh Photographic Society and the Royal Photographic Society Alam is a visiting professor of Sunderland University in the UK. He is currently setting up a media academy in Bangladesh.
